### Swedish Immigration to America SWEDISH LANGUAGE NEWSPAPERS

Almost from the beginning of their immigration to America, the Swedes depended on newspapers to help preserve their culture. These Swedish-language newspapers published letters from newly settled immigrants who sang the praises of America. They became important, too, as forums for rallying fellow Swedish-Americans to the cause of preserving their native language and heritage. During the years of mass immigration in the late 1800s, over 1,000 different Swedish-American newspapers were published in 30 states across America. They not only reported the news, but also announced and advertised social and political events that unified Swedish Americans and kept their native identity alive.

The first of these newspapers was published in 1851 and named the Skandinavien. It did not live a long life but was the start of a long line of Swedish-American papers. The Hemlandet Det Gamla och Det Nya (The Old and the New Homeland) began publication in Galesburg, Illinois, in 1855. T. N. Hasselquist, A Swedish Lutheran pastor from the Augustana Synod, published this paper. It served as a forum for the American-Swedish Lutheran churches.

In 1866, the first liberal alternative to the religious newspapers, the Svenska Amerikanaren was published in Chicago. The publishers of the secular papers, revolting against the social constraints that bound them in Sweden, pressed for a Swedish-American, rather than a Swedish, identity for their people. They resisted the desire of many Swedish Americans to set themselves apart from other ethnic groups. Preserving every aspect of their Swedish heritage did not make sense to these publishers. The secular papers competed fiercely against the Hemlandet and other church-sponsored papers.

The secular and church-sponsored Swedish-language papers suffered negatively in the years leading up to and after World War I. The pressure across the United States to Americanize led to the loss of subscriptions and in some cases to business failures. By the end of the mass emigration in 1930, most of these papers were extinct. Although first-generation Swedish Americans continued to look to the Swedish-language papers for news of their native country, second- and third-generation Swedish Americans were less interested and were unskilled in reading Swedish. The more the Swedish immigrants and their descendants blended into America society, the less need they had for the Swedish-language papers. Today, only a handful survive.

#### Directions to 2212 Hare Rd., Waterford, PA:




